

# CONNECTING FAMILIES TO SUPPORT AND RESOURCES

Support from donors and community partners help connect families like Tiffany's to the support and resources they need to thrive.

Tiffany, a single mom of 3 school-age children, has struggled with depression and anxiety for several years. Due to the pandemic, she did not have steady employment or income and experienced the onset of a major depressive episode. Tiffany was feeling hopeless, sad, and a loss of motivation. This significantly impacted her ability to effectively search for employment and fulfill her responsibilities at home, which now included teaching her children when school went virtual. She reached out to Sunbeam for help from a therapist.

Tiffany connected with a therapist who partnered with her in developing a range of coping strategies to manage overwhelming feelings of anxiety and depression. Feeling more stabilized and able to apply healthy coping, Tiffany's therapy focus shifted to helping her find and strengthen her support systems so she did not have to face the challenges of single motherhood alone. Tiffany's depression lifted. She effectively used her new skills to build hope and the motivation to fully engage in life. She found employment and works at maintaining a good routine with her children and virtual schooling.

## INFANT AND EARLY CHILDHOOD MENTAL HEALTH

Brains develop 90 percent of all neural connections by age five. Early life experiences and relationships with caregivers matter. The experiences of infants and young children, positive or negative, have a long-lasting impact on health and well-being into adulthood. A nurturing, caring relationship with at least one adult can help buffer the impact of adversity in the earliest years.

Babies and young children cannot wait until they're older for their mental health needs to be addressed. The time is now for us to speak for them and we know how. Sunbeam is committed to supporting the mental health and well-being of Oklahoma infants, young children, and their caregivers. Sunbeam is one of the only organizations in Central Oklahoma with a specialization in Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health. Services are provided along a continuum of promotion, prevention, and treatment to support relationships between young children, prenatally to age five, and their caregivers. Supporting the earliest relationships helps mitigate the impact of adversity and reduces the likelihood of needing more intensive and costly interventions later, which can occur when mental health concerns go unaddressed in the earliest years. Mental illness, substance use, domestic violence, and chronic health issues can be mitigated as a result of nurturing caregiving relationships early in life.

## CONNECTING TO EARLY CHILDHOOD SERVICES

Learning begins long before a child starts kindergarten. Access to high-quality early childhood education is essential to the future success of babies, toddlers, and their families. Children who are not prepared to start school are at risk of never catching up, leaving an achievement gap that can persist throughout their entire lives. This gap can be linked to social and economic problems later in life, including illiteracy, teen pregnancy, and high dropout rates.

### **SUNBEAM'S EARLY EDUCATION CENTERS PREPARE CHILDREN FOR SUCCESS**

With support from donors and community partners, Sunbeam's early education centers and partner sites prepare young children from prenatal to age five to enter kindergarten with the skills necessary to be ready for school - and beyond.

Thanks to support from donors and community partners, during the 2019-2020 program year Sunbeam's early education centers provided 544 children from under-resourced neighborhoods with high-quality Early Head Start education through Home Visitation services and full-day, full-year, center-based services at 13 locations across Oklahoma City.

Early Childhood Services' goals are: high quality learning experiences, strong families, and good health and well-being. Sunbeam's goals align with Head Start Child Development and Early Learning Framework, Oklahoma Early Learning Guidelines and Creative Curriculum/Teaching Strategies (TS) GOLD curricula and assessment tools. The five major goal areas are: Social-Emotional, Language and Literacy, Approaches to Learning, Cognition and General Knowledge, and Physical Well-Being.



## SUNBEAM EMPOWERS FAMILIES

Sunbeam creates a foundation for continued achievement and readiness for school by building community support among schools, teachers, and families. Families are involved in every aspect of their child's learning and development, as well as their own personal and professional development.


- Family Advocates help families problem-solve, locate resources within the community, and set and achieve goals.
- Through monthly Parent Committee Meetings, families have the opportunity to meet and network with other families to share ideas and engage in discussion about their children's learning and experiences.
- Families involved in the Policy Council participate in program planning and decision making, including topics such as program goals and objectives, policies and procedures, program monitoring, and program funding proposals.
- The Health Services Advisory Committee and Education Committee provide families with opportunities to assist with the guidance of health-related services and classroom curriculum activities.
- Families are invited to volunteer in their child's classroom, apply for employment opportunities, join in Parent-Child Interaction activities, and participate in monthly Parent Education Workshops.
- Male/Father Engagement activities are offered monthly to encourage father figures and male family members to be actively involved in their child's life and rearing.

## EDUCARE OKLAHOMA CITY RAISES THE BAR ON EARLY EDUCATION

As Sunbeam's flagship early education center, Educare Oklahoma City is part of the Educare Learning Network. This network of schools is widely respected as one of the nation's most effective early childhood models and uses an approach that extends beyond the classroom to help children, families, and neighborhoods thrive. As its incubator of best practices from around the country, Sunbeam leverages the expertise at Educare Oklahoma City by sharing it with all of its early education centers and partner sites across Oklahoma City.

## COMMUNITY PARTNERS

For the 2019-2020 program year, Sunbeam’s early education centers and partner sites included Avery Chapel Child Care, Childcare Network 204, Children’s Lighthouse I, Educare OKC, Emerson’s Little Wonders, Kiddie Village, Linwood Early Learning Center, Little Hearts Child Development Center, Santa Fe South Early Childhood Center, Southwest Child Development Center, Tony Reyes Bilingual Child Development Center, U.S. Grant’s Little Generals, and West Oak Head Start.

During the 2019-2020 program year:


- Sunbeam’s early education centers and partner sites prepared 544 babies and toddlers for school readiness at 13 sites, while maintaining an average monthly enrollment of 82%.
- Family Advocates provided 2,145 family members with support services. 80% of early childhood clients were income eligible, 6% were over income eligible, 6% were foster children, and 8% had public assistance through TANF or SSI.
- In total, 100% of babies and toddlers lived at or below the poverty line. 465 were income eligible, 48 received public assistance, 8 were experiencing homelessness, 35 were in foster care, and 38 were over the income requirement.
- 383 of all children enrolled were fully up-to-date on well-child health exams, and 97% had access to a dental provider, and 573 had Medicaid.

With support from the community, Sunbeam empowered families across Central Oklahoma. This includes parents like Amanda, whose 4-month-old son, Robert, attends one of Sunbeam’s early education centers.



# CONNECTING TO FAMILIES THROUGH SENIOR SERVICES



***Sunbeam partnered with local law enforcement to bring holiday joy and toys to 673 grandchildren who were being raised by their grandparents. This holiday program was made possible by generous support from the Oklahoma City Police Department, the Oklahoma County Sheriff's Office, and TRIAD.***

In Oklahoma, the rates of poverty and depression among seniors is higher than the national average. Oklahoma also consistently ranks as one of the top states in the nation for the number of grandparents who are raising their grandchildren. For over 50 years Sunbeam has addressed the needs of seniors in central Oklahoma through its Caregiver and Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Programs.

Thanks to support from donors and community partners, during the 2019-2020 program year:


- 960 senior adults stayed active, connected to their communities, found permanent housing, or received support as they continued living in their own homes.
- 704 caregivers utilized support and resources through support groups, seminars, and respite care.
- 743 grandchildren received school supplies, holiday gifts, and other support services.
- 77 senior companions provided quality, in-home support and companionship to 90 homebound seniors.
- 89 seniors experiencing homelessness received care and support at the Senior Shelter.

## THE SENIOR ENGAGEMENT PROGRAM PROVIDES SUPPORT AND RESOURCES

Caregiver Engagement serves Oklahomans who provide care to a loved one in Oklahoma, Cleveland, Canadian or Logan County. This program creates an environment of support for families providing care to others in their families as well as to grandparents who are raising their grandchildren. With the goal of encouraging self-care, the program provides support groups, respite care, training services, and resource referral. Sunbeam also offers caregivers access to the CareTrak program, which helps Oklahomans track family members who tend to wander away from home. In the spring of 2020, Sunbeam launched online support groups to safely provide assistance to caregivers and grandparents raising their grandchildren.

## CONNECTING TO SAFE, LOVING FOSTER CARE HOMES

Children throughout Oklahoma and are in need of safe, loving homes where they can grow and thrive. The child welfare system relies on quality foster agencies and foster parents to provide shelter and a support system to children in foster care.

Thanks to support from donors and community partners, during the 2019-2020 program year, Sunbeam placed 119 children in foster care in safe, loving homes with 34 foster families.

Sunbeam is a traditional foster care agency providing temporary care and supportive services in a home environment for children. As one of the 14 private foster care agencies in Oklahoma, Sunbeam works to improve the safety, well-being, and permanency of children from birth to 18 years of age by recruiting and training new foster parents.

While OKDHS works with biological parents on a pathway to reunification, Sunbeam provides ongoing support to families through 24/7 case management, training, and connection to resources. Children in Sunbeam's Foster Care program are also connected to the nonprofit's Early Childhood Services and Mental Health programs.

Sunbeam provides children in new placement with items from its basic needs pantry, such as clothing and hygiene items. Throughout the placement, Sunbeam's foster care team monitors placement stability, attends court hearings, and helps ensure the overall success of the child in foster care.

Sunbeam recognizes at the heart of a healthy foster care family is dedication and compassionate support. Sunbeam foster parents must be at least 21 years old and have the ability to love, understand, care for, and support a child.


Sunbeam's program is open to individuals and families regardless of marital status, sexuality, gender identity, gender expression, religion, or race.

# CONNECTING FAMILIES TO HOPE AND HELP THROUGH MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

Since 1940, Sunbeam has supported families through compassionate mental health services from a skilled team of mental health clinicians, which now includes the state's largest concentration of Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health specialists.

Sunbeam provides high-quality, holistic mental health services through individual, couples, family, and play therapy. Sunbeam offers affordable mental health services on a sliding fee scale. Clients learn ways to identify and build on their strengths to overcome difficulties. Services are also offered in Spanish. Support from Sunbeam's Mental Health Services helps clients develop coping skills, prolong stability, maintain health, and live life to the fullest.

Sunbeam's highly trained team of infant and early childhood clinicians includes a trainer of Child Parent Psychotherapy. This expertise allows staff to not only provide specialized therapy to all children, but also provide support and consultation to teachers and parents in Sunbeam's early education centers and partner sites, and Sunbeam foster parents.

To continue providing compassionate mental health care to Oklahomans during the pandemic, Sunbeam launched telehealth mental health services in spring 2020. Through this service, Oklahomans receive mental health support through video counseling sessions from the comfort of their own homes.






## OPERATING REVENUE




